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Revised Evaluation Policy for 2023-2024 Regulations

(From the Academic Year 2023-2024 onwards)

Preamble

Website : www.jmc.edu

The revised evaluation policy addresses the requirements of the 2023-2024 revised syllabi format. It has been designed by the Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) in coordination with the Office of the Controller of Examinations (COE) and inputs from the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). It outlines the standards for assessment of the students, sets the norms for the calculation of grades and ensures fairness and consistency of evaluation covering all the programmes offered in the college in accordance with the requirements of the LOCF curriculum adopted from 2023-2024 onwards.

Duration of the Programmes

As per the norms of the UGC and the Bharathidasan University (affiliating university) the duration of the UG and PG programmes are fixed as 3 years and 2 years respectively. For M. Phil (Full Time) it is 1 year while for M. Phil (Part Time) it is 2 years.

An academic year comprises of two semesters,

- 1. Odd semesters shall be from June / July to October / November
- 2. Even Semesters shall be from November / December to April / May

Each semester comprises of

1. 15 teaching weeks, with each week comprising of 30 hours of teaching spread over 6 days

or

- 2. 90 working days covering 450 hours of teaching and
- 3. 18 working days for conduct of Continuous Internal Assessment Examinations and evaluation.

Outcome Based Education (OBE)

The OBE format, strengthened in the revised 2023-2024 regulations, has clearly defined programme outcomes (POs), programme specific outcomes (PSOs) and course outcomes (COs) for all UG and PG and MPhil programmes offered by the college. Apart from regular core courses, generic elective courses, ability enhancement courses and skill enhancement courses are offered under OBE with more choices and credits than the earlier 2020-2021 regulations.





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Course

The term '*course*' is applied to indicate a logical part of the subject matter of the programme and is invariably equivalent to the subject matter of a "paper" in the conventional sense. Each course is designed variously under lectures / tutorials / laboratory or field work / seminars / practical trainings /assignments / report writing etc., to address the need of teaching and learning.

Credit

The term '*credit*' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in relation to the instructional hours assigned to it with a caveat that in no instance the credits of a course can be greater than the hours allotted to it.

Courses and Credits in UG and PG Programmes

The revised distribution of the courses, total marks and the credits for the UG and PG programmes are as listed in tables 1.1 - 1.4.

Question Paper Pattern, Distribution of Marks and Evaluation

Academic Year 2023-2024 onwards

- A. <u>Theory Courses:</u> For the purpose of evaluation, the performance of the student is measured as percentage of marks and then converted to grades. Evaluation for each course shall be done by
 - 1. continuous internal assessment (CIA) by the course teacher and
 - 2. performance in the end semester examinations

The ratio between Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End Semester Examination (ESE) for theory will be 25:75. From the academic year 2023-2024 onwards, the components of the CIA are as follows
